DID JESUS START HIS MINISTRY WITH TEENAGERS??????

OR

How did Jesus view the role of youth and young adults in the church?

Well, Jesus never came right out and gave us a direct answer to that question, however we do have some clues. Let's look a little deeper at this question. Matthew chapter 17 verses 24,25 and 27 says the following:

24 After Jesus and his disciples arrived in Capernaum, the collectors of the two-drachma temple tax came to Peter and asked, "Doesn't your teacher pay the temple tax?" 25 "Yes, he does," he replied. (Jesus says), 27 "But so that we may not cause offense, go to the lake and throw out your line. Take the first fish you catch; open its mouth and you will find a four-drachma coin. Take it and give it to them for my tax and yours."

Why is this important? As we see, the other disciples were present, however Jesus only provides the temple tax for himself and Peter. Why didn't Jesus pay the taxes for the other disciples? We learn some other key information in the Talmud, (Rabbinic writing of all aspects of the Jewish life and religious observances). 1. Temple tax is to be paid by all males over the age of 20 years. 2. At the age of about 13, a young Jewish male would begin Rabbinical studies if he was to go into religious studies. If he was unable to find a teacher to accept him he would go into his father's business. 3. A young man was expected to be married by around the age of 18. 4. A teacher would not accept a student that was older than himself.

In Luke 4:38-39 Jesus heals the mother-in-law of Peter, therefore we know Peter was married. Since Peter was also responsible to pay the Temple tax we know he was at least 20 years old. Peter is listed first in almost all of the gospels and in the book of Acts. Why? This may be because he was the oldest of the disciples. Jewish males would in most cases follow their father's career paths, yet we know of none of the disciples' sons becoming early church leaders. Could this be because they started following Jesus prior to the age of 18, dedicated their lives to Jesus and thus never married or had children? We know Peter was married but no mention of him having children either. Jewish families were expected to have children. Luke 3:23 tells us, "Now Jesus himself was about thirty years old when he began his ministry....." This tells us that the disciples would have been at least under 30 years of age. Other information tells us they were probably much younger than that even. If the disciples were between the ages of 13 and 20 when they were called by Jesus and Jesus' ministry lasted 3 to 3 1/2 years, they would have been maybe 16 or 17 to 23 or 24 years old at the time of Matthew 28:16-20, The Great Commission!

So how did Jesus view the role of youth and young adults in the church? Well, it is very possible that he put the future of the church in the hands of 11 young people on that mountain when he delivered the Great Commission to the disciples. Nothing is different today, as followers of Jesus, we at Agape Youth Ministry and White Mountain Youth INC. feel it is our responsibility to equip our youth with the knowledge and tools to bring about a faithful and loyal following for the Church of Jesus Christ in the future, through sound Biblical teaching, just as Jesus did!
